

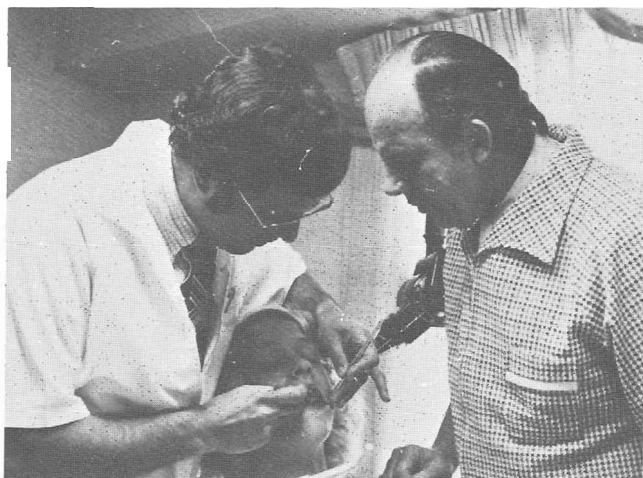

School Of Dentistry Initiates Senior Externship Program

The School of Dentistry has initiated a new concept into the undergraduate curriculum: the Senior Dental Externship Program. "One of the main objectives of the eight-week summer program was to show senior dental students what private practice is like before graduation," explained Dr. Jon K. Park, program administrator.

For the pilot program this summer, 10 seniors were selected to participate on the basis of their academic standing and clinical competency. The 15 Maryland dentists (preceptors) participating also had to meet certain criteria to be eligible. Among other things, they had to be a member in good standing in organized dentistry, conduct an active practice of a minimum of four days a week, maintain two or more functioning operatories, and have graduated from dental school at least three years prior to selection.

In order to conduct the program, it was necessary for it to be approved by the Faculty Council and then by the Maryland State Legislature since a change in the Dental Practice Act was required for the go-ahead.

Externs worked a minimum of 32 hours a week and their experiences varied from preventive treatment to complex restorative procedures. They received no clinical credits toward graduation; however, each office maintained a record of specific services performed by the extern. This record will become a part of the

student's academic record. In addition, each extern received a weekly salary from his preceptor.

Within the framework of the program, the externs were often able to participate in dental and community related activities with their preceptors, such as attending dental society meetings. They also observed other practices in the community in addition to dental laboratories and pharmacies.

Following the completion of the pilot program, preceptors and externs attended an evaluation meeting. According to Dr. Park, there were no major complaints. All preceptors agreed that the program should be continued and that students should be screened carefully to insure a comfortable working relationship.

Dean John J. Salley Resigns, Dr. Errol L. Reese Named Acting Dean

Dr. John J. Salley resigned his position as dean of the School of Dentistry September 30 to accept an appointment as associate vice-president for graduate studies and research at Virginia Commonwealth University in Richmond.

The Board of Visitors at VCU created the new position to coordinate the 54 masters and doctoral programs and to develop new graduate programs utilizing facilities among the 12 schools on VCU's two campuses. Dr. Salley is also coordinating research programs and developing new grant sources.

Dental Students Learn How To Treat Handicapped Patients

An estimated four million Americans have severe physical and mental handicaps resulting from such conditions as cerebral palsy, muscular dystrophy, cystic fibrosis, polio, epilepsy, mental retardation and blindness.

These conditions present difficulties in treatment for the dentist who has not been trained to deal effectively with these kind of patients, particularly when the patient is crippled, paralyzed, or emotionally unstable.

The School of Dentistry was recently awarded a grant of \$466,992 from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation to support programs for training dentists in treatment of the handicapped.

"The grant money has made it possible to expand the dental school's special patient clinic to a five day a week operation," said Dr. Earle M. Schulz, Jr., director of the Dental Care Program for the Handicapped. The grant is also being used to provide staff salaries and special equipment.

The special patient clinic has six treatment rooms. Patients are referred by the dental school clinic or by agencies dealing with the handicapped, i.e. Baltimore Association for Retarded Citizens, St. Elizabeth's School, Del Ray School.

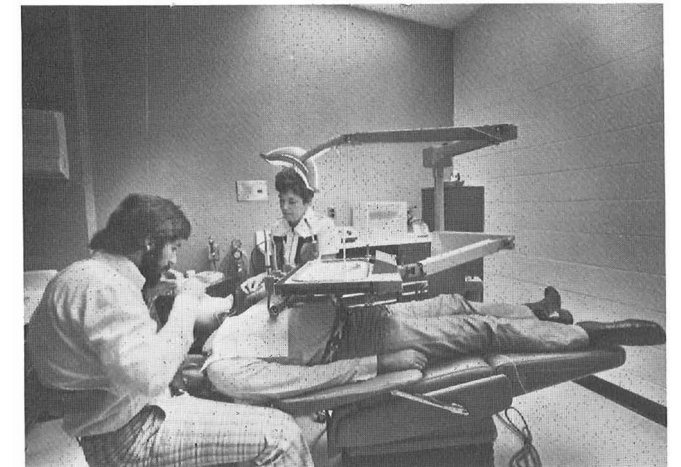
UMAB dental students are introduced in the classroom to the various conditions of the handicapped beginning third quarter freshman year, and progress to the management of these patients by the junior year. Juniors spend two clinical days in the special patient clinic and seniors spend four clinical days taking patient histories and performing preventive and corrective dental care.

Independent Learning Center Available To Dental Community

The Independent Learning Center of the dental school is now available on a daily basis to the dental community for the purpose of continuing education. Learning by programmed self-instructional material has been proven to be an efficient, effective and rapid method of education.

Recognized as outstanding in dental education, the center has 100 study carrels and programmed self-instructional material includes 8mm. films, video tapes, synchronized cartridge-tape programs, slide-tape presentations, programmed books, records and audio tapes.

An expansion of the self-instructional program to provide this method of continuing education to dentists and dental auxiliaries of the state residing in distant locations from the dental school will be operative shortly. The School of Dentistry and five community colleges in Maryland selected for their location are working cooperatively to establish satellite learning centers for the dental community in their geographical area.

Two faculty members are in the clinic at all times assisting the students. Dr. Arthur Hayden is the clinic director. In January, Dr. Thomas Daley, periodontist, will also join the staff.

"With the right approach and background knowledge, most patients with handicaps are manageable," said Dr. Schulz. "The program is running smoothly and I do believe the students are learning how to treat these patients," he added.

All information on training dentists to treat the handicapped will be developed into independent learning resources and will be available to private practicing dentists through the school's Independent Learning Center. Continuing education courses in this area are also being planned and may possibly begin in the fall of 1975.

Dr. Conrad L. Inman Sr. Receives Honorary Doctor Of Science Degree

Dr. Conrad Lucius Inman, Sr., who has practiced dentistry for almost 60 years in Maryland, received an honorary doctor of science degree at the annual commencement exercises at the University of Maryland at Baltimore on May 31.

While the major portion of his professional activities have been devoted to Maryland dentistry, Dr. Inman has gained national recognition through his work with the American Society of Oral Surgeons, the American Board of Oral Surgery and the Middle Atlantic Society of Oral Surgeons, of which he was a founder.

During the 59 years he has served Baltimoreans, Dr. Inman has been elected to numerous national and local offices and has received special awards and recognition for his outstanding work in dentistry.

These honors include: Fellow of the American College of Dentists; Distinguished Alumnus Award, University of Maryland Dental School; National Psi Omegan of the Year Award; Gorgas Odontological Society, University of Maryland; and Omicron Kappa Upsilon Honorary Dental Society.

While serving on the staff of many area hospitals, Dr. Inman has also served as president of the Baltimore City Dental Society, Maryland State Dental Association, Psi Omega Dental Fraternity, and the Alumni Association of the School of Dentistry.

A native of Mount Airy, N.C., he studied for three years at the Baltimore College of Dental Surgery and graduated in 1915.

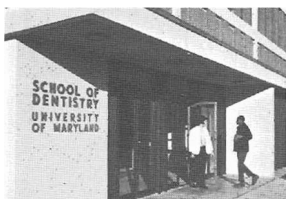

Career Day Attracts over 200 Students, Parents, Teachers

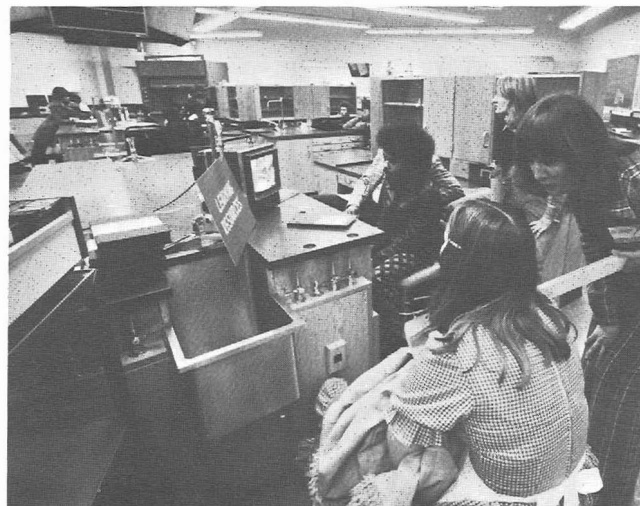


Nine colleges and 35 high schools throughout the state of Maryland were represented at the fourth annual Career Day held in February by the Student Affairs Committee of the Dental School. More than 200 students, parents, teachers and counselors participated, the largest attendance since Career Day activities began.

The program this year included discussion of career opportunities in dentistry and dental hygiene; financial aid information; a tour of the school; presentation of over 20 student and faculty demonstration projects representative of the Dental School's basic science and clinical departments; and question and answer sessions.

Many of the visiting students indicated that they were already committed to pursuing a career in dentistry. Therefore, in addition to the usual questions about admission requirements and curricula, there were many inquiries concerning preparation during high school and college, to compete successfully with the growing number of applicants to dental school.

The purpose of Career Day programs is to acquaint high school and college students with the health professions of dentistry and dental hygiene. Students and counselors attending this year's activities commented that the program disseminates comprehensive, first-hand educational and career information concerning the dental health professions that generally cannot be provided by the guidance counselor.



Satellite Centers to Localize Independent Learning

The continuing education program of the Dental School has received a grant from the Maryland Regional Medical Program to help subsidize the components of the Maryland State Dental Association in establishing "satellite learning centers" for their use at selected community colleges throughout the state. The grant will help provide professional self-instructional material to be made available to local dentists and dental auxiliaries through the learning centers of several community colleges.

The teaching/ learning process via independent learning resources, as opposed to the traditional classroom lecture, has experienced tremendous acceptance and growth in the past decade. The Dental School's Independent Learning Center on the Baltimore campus is available to the dental community on a daily basis for the purpose of continuing education and provides programmed self-instructional material including 8 mm films, video tapes, synchronized cartridge-tape programs, slide-tape presentations, programmed books, records and audio tapes. Each satellite center will provide access to similar material making it possible for the practitioner to participate in continuing education on a self-instructional basis within his own community and at his own convenience.

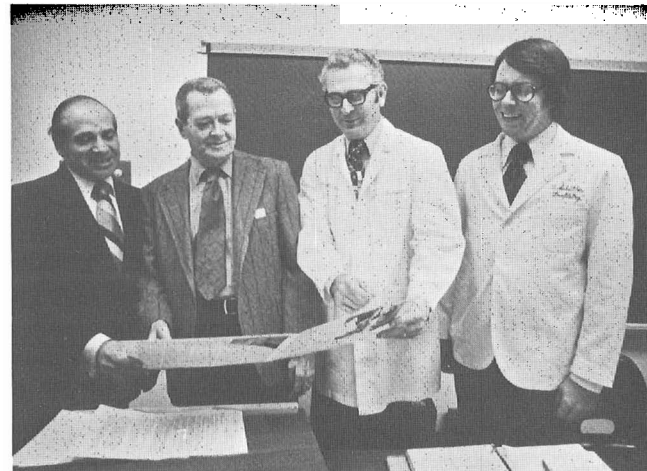
Dental Students Represented at MSDA

Last September, Larry Scheitler, president of the Student Dental Association (SDA), attended the 1975 annual meeting of the Maryland State Dental Association (MSDA). The following November, MSDA held its Board of Governors meeting at the Dental School. This was the first time MSDA had ever held a meeting on campus. These events have followed as a result of student participation in MSDA activities during the past year.

In late 1973, the MSDA adopted a resolution that six representatives of the Student Dental Association of the university "be invited each year to appoint a student observer, without vote, to each Council and Committee (as selected by the Board of Governors) and to meetings of the Board of Governors." MSDA is the first dental society in the country to invite student representation. The resolution was adopted in an effort to familiarize students with organized dentistry and to introduce them to the association before they become practicing dentists, as well as to keep members of MSDA informed, on a first-hand basis, of the needs of dental students and the changing trends within the Dental School.

Following the business meeting in November, members of the Board of Governors attended a luncheon as guests of the Student Dental Association, and toured the school.

The students selected to attend MSDA meetings report back to the Student Dental Association on board,

Dr. Hahn Retires, Dr. Leonard Named Admissions Director

Dr. William E. Hahn will retire from his position as director of admissions of the Dental School, effective June 30.

An alumnus of the Dental School, Dr. Hahn has been with the university for 44 years serving in various faculty positions in the department of anatomy—from an instructor in the early 1930's to professor in the 40's and 50's. In 1956 he became the first full-time chairman of the department of anatomy. During his tenure, he worked to increase the faculty of the department, expanding the anatomy curriculum to full operational capacity.

Dr. Hahn served on the admissions committee of the Dental School while in the department of anatomy and was appointed director of admissions in 1965. In June of 1971 he resigned his chairmanship to direct his full attention to admissions.

In addition to his D.D.S. from the University of Maryland, Dr. Hahn holds an A.B. degree in biology and a M.S. degree in anatomy from the University of Rochester.

Dr. Charles B. Leonard Jr., associate professor of biochemistry, will become the new director of admissions for the Dental School July 1, 1975. Dr. Leonard holds a M.S. and Ph.D. in biochemistry from the University of Maryland School of Medicine. He received an A.B. degree in natural science from Rutgers College of South Jersey. He began his career at the

Dental School as an instructor in 1958 and has served in various faculty positions including acting chairman of the department of biochemistry in 1965 and 1973.

Dr. Leonard was a member of the admissions committee for four years and is presently the director of the Dental School's Summer Program for incoming students, and coordinator of STEP—Specially Tailored Educational Program. As these latter two positions entail instruction and counseling of students with academic or other special problems, Dr. Leonard considers them a natural extension of the duties of the admissions director.

Dr. Salley Delivers Powell Lecture

The 1975 William B. and Elizabeth S. Powell Lecture was delivered by Dr. John J. Salley on Wednesday, April 2. The topic of Dr. Salley's lecture was "Dentistry in Transition."

Following his presentation, a portrait of Dr. Salley, commissioned by *Friends of John J. Salley*, was presented to the university by Dr. Conrad L. Inman Sr. Chancellor Albin O. Kuhn accepted the portrait on behalf of the university.

A reception in Dr. Salley's honor was held in the student lounge immediately following the ceremony. Members of the Board of Regents, university officials, those who contributed to the portrait fund, as well as members of the Executive Committee and student officers attended.

The Powell Lecture, presented annually, was established by Dental School Alumni, Drs. William and Elizabeth Powell of Alexandria, Virginia, to recognize outstanding lecturers of regional or national prominence.

Students Attend Dental Education Career Seminar

Trends in the selection of careers in dentistry indicate that an estimated 20 per cent of all dental students may someday become involved in dental education.

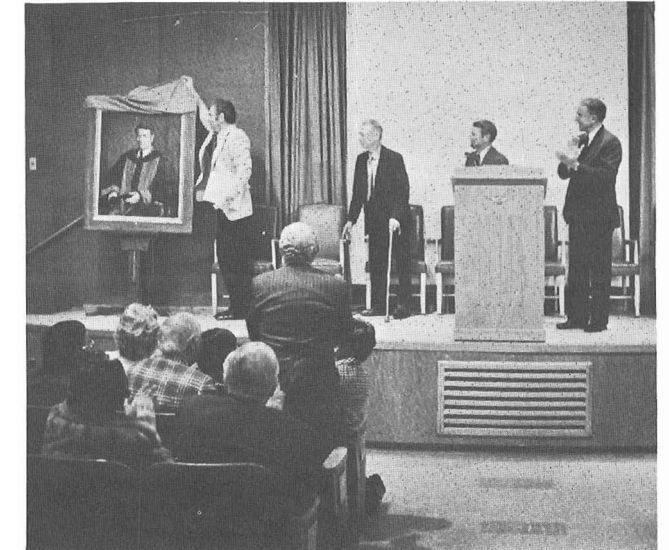
In response to student interest, the American Association of Dental Schools (AADS) sponsored a campus seminar in February entitled, "A Future in Dental Education." The purpose of the seminar was to provide information concerning opportunities and educational requisites for careers in dental school administration and teaching.

Dr. Errol L. Reese, acting dean of the Dental School, addressed participants on the topic, "A Future in Dental Administration," dealing with such questions as position options, job requirements, future demand, job mobility and salary range.

Dr. Ernest F. Moreland, interim associate dean for academic affairs and director of educational and instructional resources, discussed "The Future Demand for Dental Educators," including an overview of the occupational outlook, projected demand for the various positions available and salary expectations.

Dr. Jack D. Vandermer's topic, "What it Takes to be an Effective Dental Educator," concerned the advantages of pursuing requisite degrees; the question of how soon after graduation to enter the field of education; and general preparation for a career in dental education. Dr. Vandermer is an assistant professor in the division of oral diagnosis.

Prior to the February meeting there were no established channels for directing dental education career information. According to Dave Leatherwood, AADS representative for the school, the association would like to continue the seminar until the Dental School is able to implement current plans to include an educational careers elective in the senior dental curriculum.

Search Committee Work Continues

Since the previous report in the Winter 1974 issue of the *Dental Newsletter*, the Search Committee has reviewed the credentials of many people interested in the position of dean of the Dental School. A series of preliminary interviews of candidates selected from the applications received have been completed. Each interview series was of a two-day duration giving candidates the opportunity to meet with faculty, students, deans of the various health profession schools on campus, Chancellor Albin O. Kuhn and other university administrators.

The results of these interviews will be reviewed to reduce the number of candidates who will be invited to return to the Dental School for an in-depth interview by the committee and the chancellor.

From this group the committee will select two or more candidates whose names will be submitted to the chancellor for consideration.

New Goals Study Being Reviewed and Implemented

During the year that has passed since the Faculty Council approved the report of the New Goals Committee, several of the recommendations have been implemented fully or in part; others have been studied. To ensure that there is a consistent, continuing effort toward achievement of the ten-year goals established for the school, the acting dean has referred each of the 72 recommendations to the chairman of the committee or the department within whose purview it falls.

The status of each recommendation is being reviewed in the context of assigned priority to determine what progress has been made toward implementation; whether additional study is advisable; what steps are inherent in implementation; and what timetable is feasible.

Community colleges in the state have responded to the program with enthusiasm. The grant funds will be provided on a matching basis of \$500.00 units and initially will be limited to MSDA components with a membership of less than 75. Presently, the Eastern Shore Dental Society is working closely with Salisbury State College to establish a learning center for its membership. Satellite centers to be set up at other educational facilities in Maryland will provide independent learning opportunities to approximately 1,600 practicing dentists and approximately the same number of dental auxiliaries in areas remote from the city.

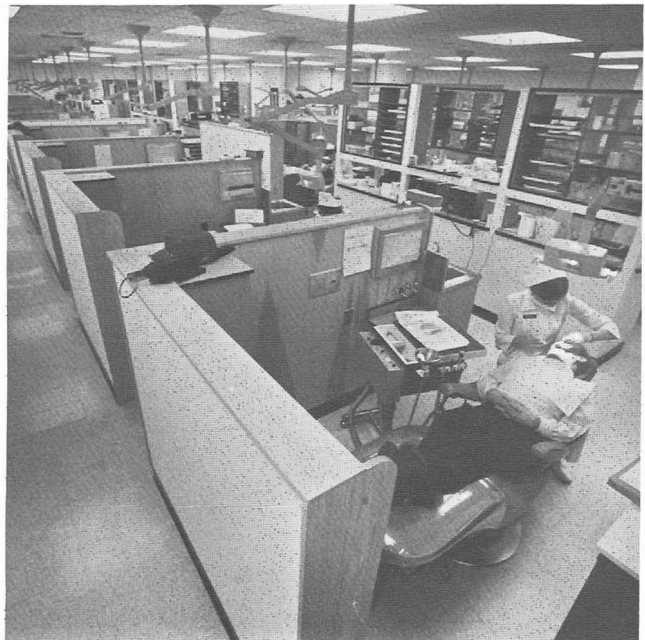
Gaver Memorial Lecture Set, May 1
