In February 1933, eleven happy, ambitious girls found themselves in a new environment with new worlds to conquer. In October this group was reenforced [reinforced] by thirty-eight who were the Junior members of the class of '36.

After an orgy of six months of intensive supervised training – both practical and theoretical – we were called one by one before our superior officer, Miss Crighton, to learn that we had successfully mounted the first landing. In recognition of this progress we were given our stripes and our first caps.

Pride and happiness mingled with a consciousness of greater responsibility, both to patient and to school, served as an incentive to urge us on our way. Just as in all other undertakings a few of our group dropped by the wayside during the first interval.

The summer months passed quickly. We saw our first graduating class attain their final goal and wondered if we, too, would some day reach those heights. Vacation renewed our energy, gave us strength and courage to encounter the second year.

Some of the hardships with which we successfully battled during this year were: Night Duty, Operating room training, classes in Obstetrics, Pediatrics, Medicine, etc. A second landing in our Journey was [was] reached – another year is over and we had our senior cuffs.

That third year passed all too quickly – with senior duties. More responsibility and more special training – Sheppard, until at last our final goal is attained. In June 1936 we, twenty-six, were graduated, donned our white uniforms and Nightingales, and now as full fledged registered nurses we are still young, healthy, and ambitious, and we always “Aim Higher”.
