Dear Miss McKinney:

This is in reply to your letter of November 26, 1952.

Theoretically all newly registered physical therapists of Maryland will eventually be graduates of approved schools, meeting all accepted standards of the two national P.T. qualifying associations. As you probably know, many residents of Maryland have formerly registered under the Grandfather clause.

An examination is given periodically.

However, in most instances a person with correct educational background and training is granted a Maryland License. It would seem that each applicant is considered individually. This I have observed.

It is suggested that you write for an application, giving a slight suggestion of your status, your residence. Address: Md. State Board of Physical Therapy Examiners, 2411 North Charles St., Baltimore, 18, Maryland.

You should obtain such a license for two reasons. The present status regarding examination may become more rigid. You may at one day wish to work in your own State. Again, this State does have reciprocity with some other States. Even if inactive within the State the cost per year is five dollars.

If this is not enough information, kindly write again.
