## OBJECTIVES

At the conclusion of this activity, participants will be able to:

1. Compare and contrast current approaches to cadaveric versus living organ transplantation.
2. Identify ethical issues commonly encountered in organ donation and transplantation and methods for addressing ethical uncertainty.
3. Explore the impact of spiritual and religious beliefs on the decision to donate an organ or receive a transplanted organ.
